LOT 1190

A pair of Chinese blue and white porcelain vases, mark of Qianlong but later Qing dynasty, each hu-shaped body painted with bands of lotus, flowerheads and scrolling tendrils, between stiff leaf, wave and lappet borders, flanked by a pair of moulded mask and ring handles, underglaze blue seal mark to bases, height 26cm (one with chipped and cracked neck).

Estimate: £600 - £900

Condition Report

1190. First vase - in good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration, typical light surface scratches to glaze and some minor fritting to mask and ring handles.

Second vase - 3.7 by 2cm section of rim missing and beneath this a repaired triangular section approx 2 by 1.5cm, from here run two hairline cracks, the first runs 4cm down and then forks horizontally one way for approx 7cm and the other way for approx 7cm through one handle, the second crack runs for approx 3cm. Otherwise the body of the vase is in generally good condition with typical light surface scratches and wear.
