LOT 1428

A New Hall porcelain part service, circa 1810, pattern No.'631', decorated with gilt enriched fruiting vine, comprising teapot, cover and stand, two handled sucrier and cover, jug, three teacups, three coffee cans, five saucers and five assorted plates, painted pattern No. to bases, largest plate 20.8cm diameter (minor faults).

Estimate: £200 - £300

Condition Report

Overall the enamels and gilding remain good with only typical wear commensurate with age and use.

Teapot - very narrow 3mm long nick to tip of spout along edge of gilt line detail, only noticeable on close inspection. Knop of cover has similar tiny nick to edge of knop where there is a small firing blemish - again only noticeable on very close inspection. Overall in very good condition. No restoration.

Teapot stand - In good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration. Typical light wear where teapot sits on stand.

Sucrier - In good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration.

Jug - In good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration.

3 teacups - each in good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration.

3 coffee cans - 2 in good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration, 1 with 2.5cm long fine haircrack to rim by handle.

5 saucers - each has noticeably more wear to the gilding, 2 in good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration, 1 has two starcracks to base, 1 with starcrack to side, 1 with 2.5cm long haircrack to rim.

Each of the 5 assorted plates displays slightly more wear.

21cm diameter dish - 0.5cm square flat chip to upper rim edge.

20cm diameter dish - In good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration.

3 18cm diameter plates - 2 in good condition overall with no cracks, chips or restoration, 1 with fine haircrack to diameter of base.
