A New Hall porcelain saucer dish, late 18th century, painted in pattern No. 20, depicting Chinese figures holding a parasol and a windmill, unmarked, diameter 22cm, together with a mixed group of mostly New Hall wares, including a teacup and saucer, painted with flowers, pattern No. 1820, a similar teabowl and saucer, pattern No. 1169, a collection of shell decorated wares, some Boy In The Window pattern and two teabowls and saucers, painted in black with flower baskets, pattern No. 308 (some faults).

Estimate: £100 - £150

Condition Report

New Hall saucer dish with man holding parasol - approx 3cm long haircrack to rim at 6 o'clock, some wear to enamels around cavetto.

Saucer dish with flowers - noticeable wear to enamels, manufacturers pitting to glaze.

Larger Chinese figure saucer - heavily worn.

3 Boy in the Window saucers and one cup - one saucer and cup both heavily worn.

Polychrome floral teabowl - chip to footrim and small nick to upper rim edge.

Shell decorated coffee can - cracked.

Shell decorated saucers - one heavily crazed, one heavily worn.

Shell decorated teacups - one cracked.

Large Shell saucer dish - badly worn.

Plate printed in black with fisherman - haircrack to rim.

Black printed saucer - totally worn.

Shell slop bowl - haircrack.

Remaining items in the lot are in good condition overall with some typical minor and light wear and some manufacturing blemishes, but nothing untoward.
